## **The Walk around Brentford & Turnham Green 1642.**

On the morning of Sunday 7<sup>th</sup> November Simon Marsh led some 15 of us on a walk around Brentford, following the course of Prince Rupert's attack on the 12<sup>th</sup> November 1642, when he stormed the town and destroyed two regiments of Parliamentary foot.

In the afternoon Stephen Porter took over from Simon and led a walk around Turnham Green. Again there was some 15 of us, (though I noticed that some of the faces had changed). Turnham Green occurred on the 13 November 1642, the day after the fight for Brentford. The advancing Royalists encountered The Earl of Essex's Parliamentary army, now massively reinforced by the London Trained-Bands and the ordinary citizens of London. Charles I abandoned his advance on London and ordered a retreat. As there wasn't much fighting at Turnham Green it has been neglected by historians, but it

had enormous strategic significance. By preventing a Royalist capture of London it changed the whole course of the war. A few years ago the Battlefields Trust ran a project to create a 'Battlefield Trail' around Brentford and Turnham Green, with a leaflet and a series of information panels explaining the course of the action. It is a good example of what can be done at other sites. Simon Marsh and Stephen Porter have also recently had a book published, "The Battle for London", about the campaign.

## **The Launch of the Battle of Barnet 1471 Project**

On Easter Sunday, 1471, a Lancastrian army led by Richard Neville, the Earl of Warwick, (Warwick the 'Kingmaker'), and a Yorkist army led by Edward IV met at the Battle of Barnet, in one of the decisive battles of the Wars of the Roses. The battle was a crucial Yorkist victory with Warwick himself being amongst the slain. However, other than a crumbling 18<sup>th</sup> century obelisk, whose writing is virtually illegible and is probably in the wrong place, there is

very little to remind people of the importance of this site. Even the exact location of the battle has become a matter of debate. On the evening of Thursday, 11<sup>th</sup> November fifteen of us gathered in a Church hall in Barnet and, after a fascinating talk from Glenn Foard about the 'discovery' of the battlefield at Bosworth, we agreed to launch the Battle of Barnet 1471 Project. The aim of the project will be to have an archaeological survey to pinpoint the exact site of the battle, and eventually open a 'Battlefield Trail' with a leaflet and a series of information panels. The Project is very grateful to the Potters Bar Golf Club who have very kindly offered us the use of their facilities for our future meetings.

### **Saturday 19 February 2011 Visit to Fort Nelson.**
