#### TO THE HONORABLE WILLIAM LENTALL Efq; Speaker of the Honorable House of Commons.



Elides the Generall account, I have already given, by one of my fervants whom I fent up to London yeflerday, I thought fit to fend this bearer Mr. Baks, who may more particularly informe you. Concerning the abundant goodneffe of God to this army, and the whole Kingdome in the late victory, obtained at Nafeby Field: The whole body of their foote taken and flaine, fuch a lift of the priforers,

could be made up in this fhort time I have fent, the horie all quitted the field, and were purfued within three miles of Leicefter : their Ammunition, Ordnance, and carriages all taken, among which there were, two Demy Cannons, a whole Culverin and a Morter peece befides leffer peeces : We intend to move to Leicefter, as foone as we have taken Order with our prifoners and wounded men : all that I defire, is, that the borour of this great never to be forgotten mercy, may be given to God in an extraordinary day of thanksgiveing ; And that it may be improved to the good of his Church, and this kingdome : which fhall be fait...fully endevoured by, Sir

Major Gen. Skippe was that through his fide a but notwith flanding he continued in the field with great refolation ; And when I defired him to goe off the field. He answered, hee would not goe fo long as a man would ftand, fill doing his Office as a valiant and wife Commander. Allo Colonell Bathr, and Colonell Instea upon their first charge were both dangeroufly wounded, behaving themfelves very gailantly, if I could enter into particulars ; much might be spoken of the resolution and courage of many Commanders both horfe and foore, in this dayes fervice.

Some Irill are among the prifoners as I am informed, I have not time to make inquiry into it ; I defire they may be proceeded againit soove, according to Ordinance of Parliament.

### For the Honourable William Lenchall Speaker of the Commons Houle of Parliament.

SIR,



Eing comanded by you to this fervice, I thinke my felfe bound to aquaint you with the good band of God towards you, and we, we marched yesterday after the King who went before as from Daventry to Haverbrow, and quartered about fix miles from him, this

day we marched towards him, He drew out to meet we, both Armies engaged, we after three howers fight, very doubtfull, at laft reuted his Army, killed and tooke about five thousand, very many Officers, but of what quality we yet know not, we tooke alfo about two hundered Carriages all he had, and all his Guns, being twelve in number, whereof two were Demie-Cannon, two Demie-Culverins, (and I thinke) the reft Sacres, we perfued the enemy from three miles fort of Harbrough to nine beyond, even to fight

of Leicefter whether the King fled. Sir this is none other but the hand of God, and to him alone belongs the Glory, wherein none are to fare with bim, the General ferved you with all faithfulneffe and houser, and the best commendations I can give him in , that I dare for he attributes all to God, and would rather perifb then affumne to bimfelfe, which is an honeft and a thrining way, and yet as much for branery may be given to him in this action, as to a man. Honeft men ferved you faithfully in this acti-on, Sir they are trusty, J befeech you in the name of God not to difeourage them, I wish this action may beget thankefulluesse, and humility in all that are concerned in it, be that venters his life for the liberty of his Country J will be truft God for the liberty of his confcience, and you for the liberty in fights for, in this he refts who is.

SIR.



His morning by day break we marched ont of Guilaburov after the Enemy, after an houres march, we dilcovered their Horie drawne up at 3, bbert-ft three miles this fide Harborough, an houre after their Foote appear'd, this was about eight in the morning, by ten wewere difposidinto a battalia on both fides, both ides with migh-

sy fhontes exprest a hearty defire of fighting, having for our parts recommended our caufe to Gods protection and realized the word, which was God our Strength, theirs Queene Mary, our forlorne hopes began the play whiles both fides labour'd for the hill and wind, which in conclusion was as it were equally devided, our forlorne hope gane back, and their right wing of Horie fell upon our seit with fuch gallantry that ours were immediately, routed above a thouland ran a long with them but fuch was the courage and diagence of the right wing back't with the Foote, that they not onely beat back the enemy from their Traine but fell in with their Foor and after two houres dilpute won all the field-peices (of which fome are Cannon ) moft of their Badgage. Morter peices, Boates, nine thouland Armes much powder and match. &c. And nigh foure thousand priloners their number was about twelve thousand, fome fix hundered flaine, many Commanders of note, of ours not aboue one hundered, our Horfe are ftill in purisite and have taken many of theirs, the Standerd isours, the Kings Wagon and many Ladies. God Almighty give us thankefull hearts for this great Victory, the most abscinte as yet obtained, the Generall. Lieutenant-Generall Cremwell, and Major Generall Skippen (who is fnot in the fide, but not dangerous) did beyond expression gallantly, fo did all our other Commanders and Souldiers, we have lost but two Captaines, though this come late, be pleafed to accept it from,
